Scripture Portion - Ex. 4:18 - 6:12

Moses & Aaron Brings God's Message

One day, God spoke to Moses from a burning bush. He told Moses that He had seen how the Israelites were suffering in slavery and had heard their cries for help. God wanted Moses to lead His people out of Egypt, but Moses was unsure if they would listen to him.

To help Moses, God gave him three special signs:

1. Moses' staff turned into a snake when thrown on the ground and then back into a staff when it look hold of the snake.
2. His hand became sick with leprosy when he put his hands into his cloak but was healed when he put it inside his cloak a second time.
3. Water from the Nile River turned into blood when poured on the ground.

These signs were to show the Israelites that God had sent Moses.

But Moses was still worried because he wasn't a good speaker. So God chose his brother Aaron to help him.

Moses and Aaron met with the leaders of the Israelites. Aaron told them everything God had said. He shared the wonderful news that God had seen their suffering and was going to rescue them. When the people heard this, they were so happy that they bowed down and worshiped God.

More Trouble before Rescue

When the Israelites left Pharaoh, they found Moses and Aaron waiting for them. They were upset and blamed Moses and Aaron for all the extra trouble.

Moses Confronts God with His Worries
